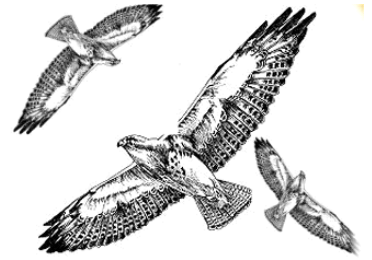

It offers some of the best hiking and cross-country skiing trails in Michigan, as well as bird and wildlife-watching opportunities. Ernest Hemingway called this land the "pine barrens of Michigan" and it was fondly dubbed the "Big Wild" by Michigan conservationist P.J. Lovejoy.</p>

SAAS Chapter Notes

Educational outreach 4-year review

Recently I compiled our educational outreach data from 2007 through 2010. Our SAAS mission is to teach people about our natural world, and we have done just that.

In 2007, our monthly programs drew 251 people. In 2008 and 2009, they drew nearly 500 people each year. We surpassed the 500 mark in 2010, with 525 attendees, averaging well over 50 per meeting. The average number of SAAS members at each program has increased from 20 in 2007 to 30 in both 2009 and 2010, while the number of non-member guests has risen from 8 to above 25.

The field trip growth has been even more phenomenal, thanks to having an actual field trip coordinator. In 2007, 2 field trips drew 16 members and 3 guests, total. In the 3 years since then, the number of field trips expanded to 9, then 12, then 18, attracting 95 people in 2008, 195 in 2009, and 220 in 2010. Interestingly, the average attendance on hikes has remained at 8 members each year. The number of guests bring the total recent attendance to about a dozen people.

In addition, 2010 included Earth Week, coordinated by SAAS. The 30 additional community events drew another 833 attendees who participated in cleanups and learned about topics ranging from resource conservation to local foods to the stars in the universe, which comprises our ultimate environment. Many thanks to all who took any part in 2010. We appreciate you!

Winter Birding at the Sault

Sat. Jan 14, 2011 and Sun 15, 2011, Jack and I joined 9 birders along with 2 leaders from Whitefish Point Bird Observatory on a winter bird trip in and around the Soo. One of the leaders had scouted out a snowy owl the day before, so we drove to the area where it had been seen and all got out of the cars to scan the fields, fence posts and phone poles. When it was finally spotted it was found sitting in the seat of an old dilapidated farm tractor and blended right in. If we had not gotten out of the cars at that exact spot, we would have passed him right by as he sat there incognito. Throughout the day, we saw 5 northern shrikes, an immature northern goshawk, 18 sharp-tailed grouse, pine grosbeaks, evening grosbeaks, common redpolls, and lots of the usual feeder birds. Snow buntings, 3 wild turkeys, 6 bald eagles, 5 rough-legged hawks and a red-tailed hawk were also seen. Around 3:30, the weather began to deteriorate drastically and the leaders wisely decided to cancel the rest of the birding for the day and head back to the Soo. Whiteouts and a blizzard ensued as we made our way back, but we all kept the vision of that snowy owl driving a tractor.

The next morning we started out again and our first birds encountered were red crossbills. We were on our way to Hulbert Bog to find gray jays. After walking the road there for more than an hour, we decided to give up. I was walking dejectedly back to the car when I looked up and saw a gray jay. I grabbed my walkie-talkie out of my pocket and hollered, "Gray jay! Gray jay!" When thinking of this later it sounded like "May day! May day!" All got good looks at two beautiful gray jays as they silently swooped down to the road to pick up seeds we had left for them. After lunch, we all headed for Whitefish Point to check out the feeders there and to maybe find a hoary redpoll. Just common redpolls were seen along with pine siskins and of course, lots of black-capped chickadees. It was getting late and most of the group had to drive back down state, so we drove to Eckerman and after many good-byes and promises to email photos etc., we all bought hot chocolates and headed home. It's as easy as 1, 2, 3!

1. Plan to count birds for at least 15 minutes on one or more days of the count. You can count for longer than that if you wish! Count birds in as many places and on as many days as you like—one day, two days, or all four days. Submit a separate checklist for each new day. You can also submit more than one checklist per day if you count in other locations on that day.
2. Count the greatest number of individuals of each species that you see together at any one time. You may find it helpful to print out your [regional bird checklist](#) to get an idea of the kinds of birds you're likely to see in your area in February. You could take note of the highest number of each species you see on this checklist.
3. When you're finished, enter your results [through our web page](#). You'll see a button marked "Enter Your Checklists!" on the website home page beginning on the first day of the count. It will remain active until the deadline for data submission on March 1st.
