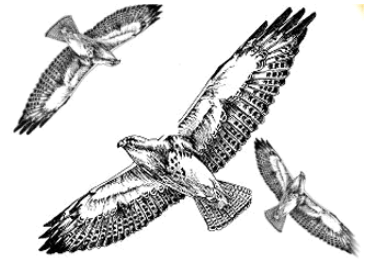

The Michigan Nature Association [MNA] would welcome any help in a work day at the Fred Dye Preserve north of Moran. This is better known as the Prairie Coneflower Preserve and is one of only a handful of sites where this beautiful plant occurs in Michigan.

Work will consist of cutting woody brush and pulling invasives. Come and learn the fascinating history of this unique preserve and find out the story of "the baby rock". Much can be accomplished in just a few hours with many willing hands. Wear gloves and boots and bring water and snacks.

**A Taste of Cave Exploration**

**October 15, Saturday 9 am**



We will travel to the Michigan Karst Conservancy property near Trout Lake in the eastern UP. Aubrey Golden will guide us about the preserve and point out the unique geological features of this limestone area. Fall colors may still be holding on in this beautiful maple forest. There will be an opportunity to explore a short way into an extensive cave system for those interested. If you want to try caving, bring along a headlight, a back up flashlight, and a helmet(bike helmet or hard hat will work). No gear which has been in other caves will be permitted due to the possibility of disease transmission to the bats that live here. **Birds and Blooms September 9 Field Trip**

What a great late summer day for 11 enthusiastic birders and botany lovers to hike out to Waugoshance Point at Wilderness State Park. Not many birds were sighted but a common yellowthroat along the shore of Cecil Bay finally popped up where we could see it. Also in the bay, a loon was calling, and a bald eagle which seemed unusually big, landed on a spit of land just off shore with great views for all. Our best birds of the day were the 7 black-bellied plovers on the beach at Waugoshance Point, with 3 or 4 still in beautiful breeding plumage.

We heard them call to each other prior to lift-off as they continued on their southern journey. A coyote ran off the beach when he saw us approaching. American toad, green and leopard frogs, garter snakes, praying mantis, and 2 clouds of flying ants kept us busy. Then there were the flowers. We have never ever seen so many fringed gentians as there were that day. Wow! They were everywhere and truly spectacular! Two rare white gentians were also spotted. Houghton's goldenrod, pitcher's thistle, nodding ladies'-tresses, brook lobelia, Indian paintbrush, tall white asters, grass-of-Parnassus, oxeye daisy, brushy cinqfoil, purple gerardia, soapwort gentian and bottle gentian were some of the many flowers seen and noted. A late blooming butterwort, and a blooming twinflower were surprise finds, as was a blooming death camas, which many of us had not seen before. Another great Steve Baker field trip. Looking forward to the next.

With great anticipation of finding American Golden-plovers, nine hikers led by Steve Baker, walked out to Waugoshance Point to find horned larks and sanderlings on the beach. Black-bellied plovers, one of which was dramatically plumaged, entertained us as they searched for food among the rocks. Many flocks of blue jays flew overhead, while

merlins, a sharp-shinned hawk, American kestrels, northern flickers, 2 great blue herons, American pipits and 100 or so common mergansers were seen in the morning. Many plants were noted along the shoreline and forest edge. Fringed gentians, turtlehead, death camas, brook lobelia, boneset, tall white asters, Houghton's goldenrod, pitcher plants, butterwort, grass-of-Parnassus, and a few nodding ladies'-tresses were found. The highlight of the day was when we went over to the Sturgeon Bay area and immediately found our target bird....5 beautiful American golden-plovers quite close to us on the shore. These birds have one of the longest migrations of any shorebird, flying from their breeding grounds in the high Arctic to southern South America. It was our good fortune that they stopped on the Lake Michigan shore for us to admire. A few black-bellied plovers were with them, which gave us a good chance to compare the two species. A lone killdeer made it a three plover species day. Another great SAAS northern Michigan trip enjoyed by all.

Many species were identified and several choice edibles were collected with Marilyn's guidance.

I especially enjoy the colorful common names for the various mushroom species such as Turkey Tail, Artist's Fungus, Hen of the Woods, and Bear Tooth. FYI, the log I took home definitely glows in the dark with a bioluminescence as Marilyn predicted. We also saw first hand the sad future of our Beech trees as they are all dying from the devastating effects of an introduced Scale insect and a fungus.
