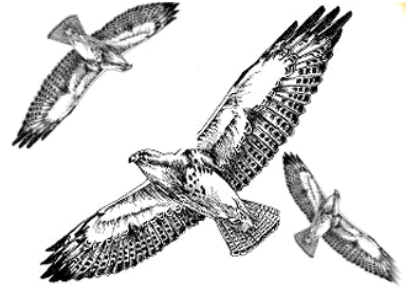


# The Kettle

### Upcoming Field Trips

#### Sept. 10 **Rare Ferns of the Eastern UP**

Meet in Mackinaw City at the State Highway Rest Area and be ready to leave at 8:30 am. We will car pool to the UP and will explore the area around East Lake, about 20 miles from the bridge. We will search for a variety of unusual ferns that favor the limestone habitats of the Niagara escarpment. Hart's Tongue Fern, Walking Fern, and Green Spleenwort are all rare endangered species that grow on the limestone cliffs, boulders, and crevices. Wear sturdy shoes. A walking stick can be helpful to navigate such uneven terrain. Optional lunch after the trip, probably in Moran. Call Steve Baker at 238-8723 with any questions.

### Keep Feeding Hummingbirds

The question that comes up often concerning hummingbirds is whether to remove feeders in the fall. Birds know when it's time to migrate. If feeders are removed in the fall, the birds are denied the extra calories and nutrition that they need to make their journey. In the fall, food sources are scarce for hummers so keep feeders filled as long as you see birds at them.
